And don't forget to be proud of your HSC membership and get your HSC polo shirt available on any race day.



08/09 Sailing Instructions

08/09 Sailing Instructions will be published prior to the start of the season and will be available on the HSC web site and at the Clubhouse. There will be a number of changes to the SIs, including the addition of Class Championship and Ladies Skipper scoring, as mentioned below. Other changes will include:

- Compulsory sign-on/sign-off for all crews
- Minimum insurance requirements for racing
- Set courses (windward/leeward & triangular courses) defined in the SI
- Scoring changes for DNC & OOD
- Current financial membership required for race entry
- 2009-2012 RRS apply for races from 1st Jan 2009

Lady Skipper's Series

Four of the Spring and Autumn Aggregate races this season are nominated Ladies races. These races will be scored as a standard aggregate race, and all boats with a female skipper will also score towards a Ladies Skipper's series.

The dates for the Ladies races are:

26 October

30 November

1 February

1 March

Class Championship

This season, we will be running a Class Championship, in parallel to the standard Club Championship series. Each Club Championship race will also score towards a Class Championship result, which will be based on a High Points scoring system.

Details of the Class Championship scoring will be included in the 08/09 Sailing Instructions.

Winter Sailing

Winter Warriors

The soup at the annual Winter Warriors regatta was wonderful; unfortunately the weather wasn't quite so great. Thanks to Clare Adshead, Stewart Simmons and Susan Smith for making soups and Charles Bagossy for providing the bread rolls

HSC's annual Winter Warriors race was held on the last weekend of August. We had just a handful of sailors prepared to take to the water - John Daymon, who was back in an Impulse, Kevin Kay, Robin McKeown, John Adshead and myself preparing our boats.

The race and rescue boat crew, Stewart Simmons, Charles Bagossy, Jeff Ward and Martin Playne were watching the sky, as the forecast was for a big south westerly front to come through about 14:00 – and sure enough, no sooner had Kevin and John D taken to the water than the wind swung through to the SW and the whitecaps started appearing. Once the heavens opened and we were pounded with hail, the decision was made to abandon the race.

We retired to the warmth of the clubhouse and enjoyed the wonderful soup.

Winter Race #4

Winter race #4 was held on 10th August one of the coldest days of the year. The HSC weather station showed



an Outdoor Wind Chill temperature of -0.1oC.

The rescue boat crew and a couple of sailors had arrived by 11:00, but at 11:30 there was still no-one rigging in the yard. Why was nobody sailing? My guess is the prospect of sailing in these conditions was not as appealing as sitting at home watching the Olympics. The race was cancelled.



Winter Race #5 – 24 August

There was a late start to Winter Race #5 while the race officers sorted out some committee boat issues. Once on the water it was a perfect winter's day, with a very light, shifty wind. We had Pacer, Taser and Sabot classes out for the race. The ladies dominated the racing – with all boats except one being skippered by one of the ladies.

Winter Race #6 – 14 September

Yet again, the weather got the better of us. The forecast was for a 30-40knot NW gale, gradually abating. Sure enough, the wind was howling when Paul Stephenson and I went down to launch Lady Isa at 9:30. The Race Officer made the call that there would be no racing in these conditions, so we hoisted the AP over A and called it a day.

TWO DAYS ON "THE LAKE"

(Lake Balaton is 80 km long and 10 km wide, about 1/3rd size of Pt Phillip Bay.)

We got to "the lake" this year, the biggest lake in Central Europe, on the invitation of the Hungarian sailing coach, Tamas.

- "you've got to see her, we race her on the lake, her name is Capella, she's a beauty"
- And she was. 12 metres long, 2½ metres wide. The fastest old boat on the lake.
- "There's a Cup race on the weekend, 5 races in two days you two are in the crew".

Day 1 - Race 1

- Light winds 8 10 knots, Tamas is steering. I'm on the winch.
- Good start, by the first mark we're leading the 50 boats in the fleet.
- 8 people on board, 6 are regulars. Sailing language is German.
- I'm lost with their German terminology. Rita sorting the ropes (by colour)
- Tamas is not happy with my winch work, and I banish myself to the front of the boat working the monster spinnaker.

Half way through the race, I find myself buried, soaking wet in complete darkness, down the "sewer". Sitting in the corner under the sail, is a moment of silent bliss. When I come up, we are still in the lead. Archenemy, an American designed "flying saucer" with water ballast, is 100 metres behind. We cross the line 1 minute ahead.

The wind is dropping, we cruise around waiting. No wind, the lake is sparkling and 25 degrees. Racing is called off for the day. Afternoon "dinner" on the grass, by "the lake". Plenty of goulash and local reds and whites. We are second on handicap.

Day 2 - Race 2

- Early start. Tamas changes boats to a smaller class.
- We are short handed, with only 3 regulars, 3 girls, one junior, and me.
- The owner of the boat asked if I wanted to steer. Firm NO!
- The "maintenance man" takes the helm.
- Light winds -8-10 knots.
- Shit start, we are 30 seconds behind the leaders.

Halfway, we claw back to second place behind archenemy. Spinnaker goes up (almost) - a monster wineglass develops, 5 minutes of desperate struggle. Boats pass left and right. We are falling over the line in 7th or 8th place.

Race 3

- I suggest not using the spinnaker. Voted down.
- Better start, we are in the leading bunch, and I am trimming the main

- Rita clearing the ropes
- Wind lightens, this time we got it right, hanging on to a dropping spinnaker longer than the rest of the fleet, we catch archenemy on the last leg, and come across the line in first place.

Race 4 - Last Race

- Light winds 5-6 knots
- Good start. By the first mark, leading the fleet
- Spinnaker works fine
- "Maintenance man" starts to play the failing wind, going all over the place.
- On the last leg. We are killing them.
- We cross the line 3½ minutes ahead of the fleet, archenemy second.
- Is the margin enough?

Going home under the jib only, we drop a long line from the boat, time for a swim. The only rule on the rope is simple – only the last person on it can have a "pee". On the way home, lots of red flags flying from the back of the boats. And I thought we got rid of the "Commos" 10 years ago. Long wait for presentation on the balcony of the yacht club. Maybe those red flags weren't for the "Commos" after all!

All the food and grog is long gone by the time the trophies appear.

It wasn't enough. We got 3rd. Archenemy got second, and you probably guessed it, Tamas got first. With a wry smile he turns to me – "you've got to know how to pick your opposition".

On the insistence of boat owner "uncle" Gyula, Rita and I ended up with the PEMPO KUPA, the only one in Australia!
